

Divine Mercy Image The Heart of Mercy... (Flynn, pp 91-96)

Last week we explored the image of the rays as depicted directly from St. Faustina's words: "These two rays issued for the from the very depths of My tender mercy when My agonized heart was opened by a lance on the Cross." (Diary, 299).

So, let's now look into the depths of that merciful heart...But looking at the Divine Mercy Image, there is no heart to be seen.... Why is His pierced heart not visible?

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In his book, '7 Secrets of Divine Mercy', Flynn proposes that we consider another image of Merciful Love: the *Sacred Heart Image* based on Christ's appearances to St. Margaret Mary:

In this image we see the wounded Heart on a throne of flames below the cross.

It is an image of Christ crying out for us to understand how much He Loves us – how deeply he is grieved by our sins and our rejection of His Love.

If we trace the rays backward and open Jesus's garment, we would find *the wounded heart* pierced and burning with love for us.

Both images reveal Christ's Merciful Love, one as a continuation and extension of the other: "The Sacred Heart Image shows us the *source* of mercy – while the Divine Mercy Image shows us the *distribution* of Mercy."

The difference lies in our call to respond:

When we view the image of The **Sacred Heart** we're called to respond by *returning His love*, by *seeking to console His heart* and *make reparations*.

Whereas

When we view the image of The **Divine Mercy** we are called to respond by *embracing the blessing* {remember His hands}; *receiving His mercy*, and by *placing all our trust in Him*.
