ALL SAINTS' DAY

When we remember all the Saints, naturally we think of our deceased grandparents, parents, family members and friends. We are inspired! As Pope Francis reminds us, the love they have shown us is never forgotten because they shared what God gave them, and did so generously. Now it is our turn to accept the kindness, compassion, patience, and forgiveness of Jesus and share Christ's love - in season and out of season, when convenient and when inconvenient. Love never ends!

Monday, November 1st, All Saints' Day Mass is offered at 7 a.m. The Solemnity of All Saints' is not a Holyday of Obligation this year.

ALL SOULS' DAY TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 2

On All Souls' Day there will be a special Mass at 5:30 p.m. (in addition to the 7 a.m. Mass) to pray for all the members of our Families who have died during this past year. A candle with your Loved One's Name will be lighted and placed on the Altar. After Mass you are invited to take the Christ-Candle home as a reminder that in the month of November we pray especially for those who have died. (Please note: if you wish the name of a deceased member of your Family to be remembered, please call the Rectory.)

WHY DO WE PRAY FOR THE DEAD?

Praying for the dead might not make sense to nonbelievers, but for Catholics it is an important part of our Faith Tradition, rooted in the Old Testament readings and supported by the Catechism and the Church's funeral liturgy. Our Faith teaches us to pray for the dead, although people hope that those who die are with God and the angels and saints.

The Catechism of our Church teaches that those who die in the State of Grace pass through a state of purification that we call purgatory. We believe that we can assist those in purgatory by prayers, especially the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and other forms of spiritual support, such as the Rosary.

During this month of November, we pray daily at Mass for your deceased family members and friends. I encourage you to **inscribe their names in the Book of Remembrance in the front of Church** by the Communion rail on St. Joseph's side. Let us all pray for the deceased, and for one another who grieve their loss.




PICK OF THE WEEK


LEARN THE CONFESSIONS OF ST. AUGUSTINE, SIX-PART SERIES


