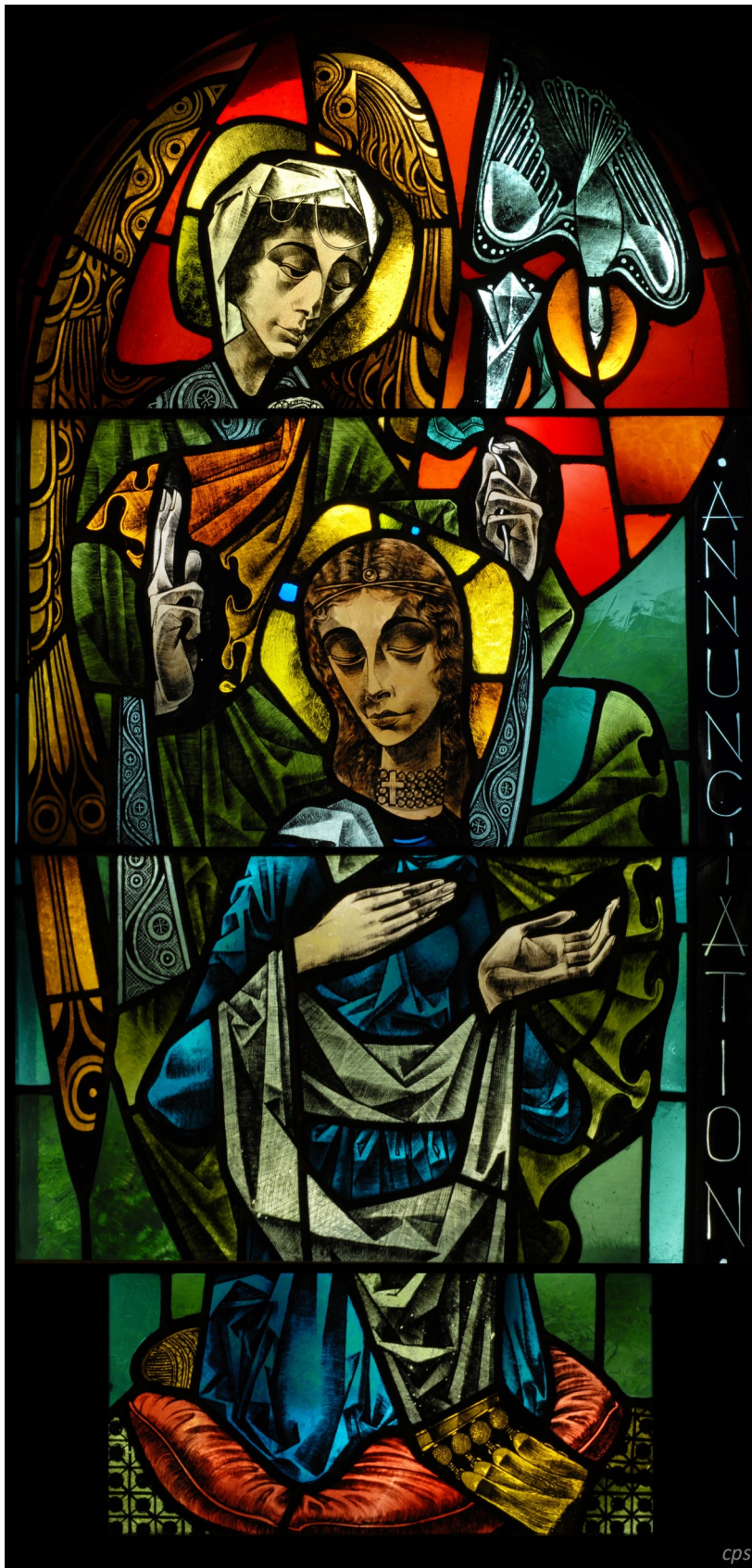

Summertime, for many brings thoughts of time off, vacation, getting together with family and friends, relaxing, and having fun. Really?

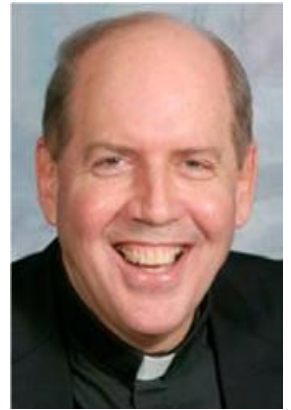
Our lives are far more complicated than we would like. We are working longer hours and taking shorter vacations. Oftentimes we have too much to do. People that you love are depending on you. You are faced with deadlines that seem impossible to meet. You are stressed, and it is happening more often, with Doctors warning us about the harm undue stress can do to our bodies.

If you do an internet search about stress, here are some suggestions to deal with it: exercise, spend time with friends and family, laugh, learn to say no, learn to avoid procrastination, spend time with your pet, etc. Some of these stress management ideas will seem good, but impossible, because you are too busy.

One suggestion not on the list is PRAYER. We all have our own way to pray. One of the great spiritual writers of our time, Jean Vanier, wrote: “Prayer is like a secret garden made up of silence and rest and inwardness. But there are a thousand and one doors into this garden, and we all have to find our own.” So, what works for one, may not work for another. The person who loves to pray the rosary, may find it hard to sit and meditate before the Blessed Sacrament. Another person may like to dive into reading the Bible, and find the rosary difficult to pray.

The Book of Psalms proclaims, “We are all wonderfully made!” God is always accessible to each of us in our own way if we are open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit and are sincere in our searching. Even when we are busy—especially when we are busy.

The single most important quality necessary for prayer is, first and foremost, the desire to do it! If you have that, you have already won the biggest battle. After this, it is a matter of patience, persistence, and the enduring gift of faith. Sometime today, find a quiet place, commit to staying two minutes, and just talk to God who dwells in you! Do it tomorrow, and the next day. You won’t be sorry.



THE FOURTH OF JULY

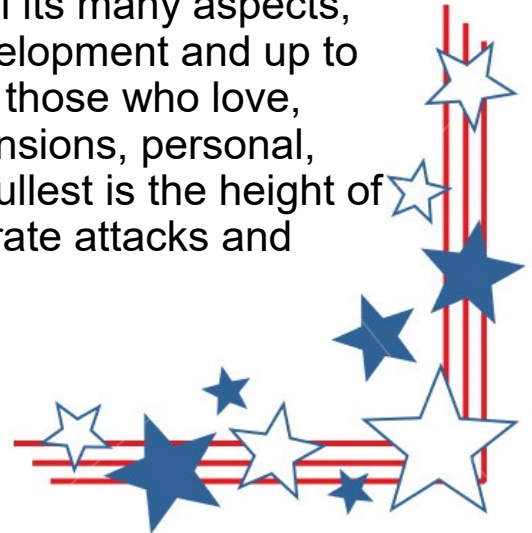

Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul

The Power of Humility

Last week my daughters and I went to see the live-action version of Aladdin. I hadn't seen the original since its release in 1992, so for me the story was new again. Jafar, the prideful, manipulative antagonist, loses his freedom in his crazed pursuit to be the most powerful being in the universe. Of course, Aladdin, the humble, kind-hearted, street-kid finds happiness, not in power and riches, but in love.



Jesus taught humility. He chose a humble man to be the rock upon which he would build his church. For me, the most poignant part of the Lord's Passion is when Peter denies Jesus, hears the cock crow and immediately feels crushed with sorrow from his offense. I love Saint Peter for this. Then, after the resurrection Jesus asking Peter three times, "Peter, do you love me?" Peter's answer, "Lord, you know I love you," and Jesus, "Feed my sheep." Still after 2,000 years we have a shepherd, a humble, loving, powerful successor of St. Peter--our Pope.

Saul, whose name meant "asked for," was a power-hungry and violent Jewish man of Roman descent, on a mission to persecute and kill Christians. Until our resurrected Jesus knocks him off of his high horse, "Saul, why are you persecuting me?" blinding him, sending him into a time of great reflection and conversion. Jesus changes his name to "Paul," which means "small or humble." Paul is the great evangelizer of our faith. If not for Paul, perhaps the teachings of Christ would not have spread the world over.

Saint Peter and Saint Paul knew one another, the leader and organizer and the great messenger of our faith. Sts. Peter and Paul are dear to my heart. I have matching antique statues of them in my office at the rectory. Every day when I turn on the lights, I call on them and ask for the power of their humble and loving inspiration. They never fail to help me.

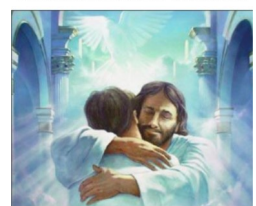
We look forward to seeing your children back at PSR on Sunday, September 8.
